Neighbourhood Plan Update

The Parish Neighbourhood Plan (NP) has recently completed the final period of public consultation, and Mid Sussex District Council has appointed an Independent Examiner to look at the Plan. If the Examiner is satisfied that the NP meets all the necessary tests, she will recommend that MSDC puts the NP to a referendum of everyone in the Parish.

This will be YOUR chance to vote on the Neighbourhood Plan and have a say in how the villages in this Parish evolve over the next 20 years.

Why have a Neighbourhood Plan?

We are all aware of the constant pressure for more building in Mid Sussex and in our Parish. The NP has been drawn up following eighteen months of consultation and public engagement with the community and is designed to give local people as much control as possible over future development in their area. It puts the parish and importantly, the community, in control to provide what the community wants, where they want it and to give profits and benefits back to the community. It also defends the parish against "unwanted" development. Previous development was largely "developer driven" and under the "normal" planning regulations the parish was unable to prevent these developments or have anything other than very minor influence on their location, type or layout. Profit went to the developer not the parish. The NP is carried out under the new regulations broadly termed 'localism'. If you live near St Martin Close or one of the sites referred to in the NP it is particularly important that you visit one of the exhibitions mentioned inside so that you are fully informed.

A Community Land Trust for the Parish

Action for Rural Sussex is helping to set up a Community Land Trust in the Parish – are you interested? CLTs are non-profit, community-based organisations which are gaining popularity in this country as a way for local communities to control local assets and facilities. They are often used in rural communities to provide the type of affordable housing that local people need – and to ensure that such housing remains for <u>local</u> people in perpetuity. They have been used to provide much needed village facilities, to rescue local shops or pubs threatened with closure, and much more.

The Neighbourhood Plan proposes that the CLT should oversee the provision of a new community hall in Handcross, and the proposed housing at St Martin Close / Coos Lane. This would ensure that local people can decide the type and design of local housing, and ensure that a new hall meets the present and future needs of the community.
