Neighbourhood Watch

The Neighbourhood Watch scheme (NHW) is looking for volunteer co-ordinators to set up individual schemes in Handcross following the successful schemes already established and covering all of Pease Pottage, Warninglid and Slaugham.

Being a co-ordinator is a simple and non-time consuming volunteering role which helps your local community, your neighbours and may decrease your household insurance premiums too!

Setting up a scheme (normally based on one or two roads in your immediate area) is quick and efficient, it just requires some initial interest from yourself and a small form to be filled in and sent to Sussex Police in order to make your scheme 'official'. All that is then required is getting your neighbours aware of the new NHW scheme in your area and agreeing to be a member of your scheme. You then pass on Police and regional information to your members (via email in most instances) and look out for each other - it really is that simple!


After the excitement of the Tour de France.....

The Tour of Britain Cycling event will be passing through Mid Sussex on **Saturday 13**th **September 2014.**

This will form part of Stage 7 (the penultimate stage of the 2014 Tour of Britain) which runs from Camberley to Brighton during which cyclists will cover a total 226.5km. The route runs through Cuckfield, Staplefield and Handcross.

Twinning 40th Anniversary Weekend

We are looking forward to meeting 30 French guests at the end of July to celebrate the 40th anniversary of the Slaugham/St Martin des Besaces Twinning Association. In September 1974, eighteen French people arrived in Handcross for the first twinning weekend and didn't know what to expect. We have accounts of the first visits in England and in France and it seems that certain customs bemused the guests on both sides of the channel.

Though travel in France is now commonplace, the joy and friendship involved in our Twinning Association is something special. Our twinning area, which encompasses several villages in the area surrounding St. Martin, is essentially a farming community in beautiful countryside in Lower Normandy.

The village of St. Martin des Besaces is similar to Handcross with several small shops, a butcher, two bakers, two florists and a mini supermarket and a very interesting museum devoted to the liberation of the area by the British during the Second World War.

There are still some people who were involved from the outset and other old friendships forged over many years. But equally, there are always new people interested to take part in the cultural exchange. We still find loads to talk about, even if it is 'franglais'. Some people are pleased at the opportunity to practise their language skills, while others are happy to enjoy the fun of sign language and the dictionary. There is always a spirit of warm hospitality, friendship and genuine enjoyment in each others' company.

This year we are taking our French friends to Battle, where it all began one might say and possibly explains how we get on so well with the Normans, though we were conquered by them in 1066. We plan to picnic in the grounds of Battle Abbey, so are hoping for good weather, though there is always a contingency in case of rain. In the evening we will have our formal meal with speeches from both English and French chairmen and there will be an exchange of gifts.

Although the original charter was the result of solemn oaths being sworn, most formality was quickly swept away by the warmth and congeniality of the exchange visits.
